We would be hosting a total of six activities throughout 2019 including an opening and closing ceremony. Our partner academic institution (Confederation College) would also host six activities throughout 2019. All activities would be open to our students, staff and faculty, as well as to the larger community and region to attend. Please see attached proposed scheduled of activities.

All of our proposed activity costs will be cost shared between internal University departments (Lakehead University International Centre, Aboriginal Initiatives, Aboriginal Cultural and Support Services and the Faculty of Education and the University's Student Union's Centres including the Aboriginal Awareness Centre and the Multi-cultural Centre). Our proposed activities would be local to our regional area in Northwestern Ontario which lies north and west of Lake Superior. The largest city in this is region is Thunder Bay, with a population around 108,000 (2016) people and an additional 123,000 (2016) people living within the region. Northwestern Ontario consists of the districts of Kenora, Rainy River and Thunder Bay. There are also several dozen First Nations in Northwestern Ontario. Within this region lies two academic institutions, Lakehead University and Confederation College; both of which have a many international students attending.

Please indicate the number of participants and the key audience of your proposed activity. (for example: are they researchers/scientists/academics; teachers/educators/trainers; students/youth; politicians/decision makers/civil servants; or development agencies such as NGOs and IGOs?)

For the most part, our activities would be open to the public and all and everyone wanting to attend would be more than welcome. Our target participants and key audience for our activities would focus around post-secondary students and families, researchers, academics, educators, students and youth. Local school boards and Indigenous (First Nations and Metis organizations) would be invited to our activities through formal printed invitations.

Please elaborate on the media visibility of your proposed activity. (for example: will there be any media coverage; if so, in which media and at what level?)

The media visibility of our proposed activities would include local and regional newspapers (Thunder Bay Chronicle Journal), local radio (CKPR, ROCK 94), and Thunder Bay television. Our online media visibility would include various Facebook groups related to our post-secondary institutions, NetNewsLedger, Twitter, and Communication Bulletins internally posted at our institutions. It is likely our media visibility would be included in Anishinabek News, Wawatay News and other smaller Indigenous group news media.

Please explain your proposed activity's relevance to UNESCO's strategic objectives.

Similar to UNESCO's goal of promoting cultural diversity and intercultural dialogue, social and human sciences, education for all, freedom of express, access to information and knowledge for the development of knowledge societies – Lakehead University's mission includes: "We believe our students make Lakehead University different. We believe that our students want an innovative comprehensive university where they have the highest chance of success. We believe that our students have the passion and drive to realize their dreams and succeed. We believe that our students want the intellectual freedom to pursue the unconventional. We believe in the diversity that comes from our students of many cultures and many nations. We believe that our students are passionate about both their own individuality and their communities. We believe in our students".

Similar to UNESCO's passion for a broad and international commitment to maintaining multilingualism and linguistic diversity, including the preservation of endangered languages, as well as providing equal access to information and knowledge - Lakehead University has a department of languages where students can learn Finnish, German, Italian, Spanish and Mandarin at an introductory level, learn advanced level competency in French, become introduced to various cultures and acquire knowledge and develop communication skills and critical thinking in a creative learning environment.

Lakehead University also has a long-standing history of teaching Algonquian languages (Ojibwe, Oji-Cree and Cree). We have an unique program offering fluent students qualification and registration with the Ontario College of Teachers in these languages. We have been providing this program for over 30 years.
