Dr. Brian Schrag is SIL International's Ethnomusicology and Arts Coordinator, and founder of the Center for Excellence in World Arts (Dallas), a graduate program in applied EthnoArts. He has engaged in sustained arts research and development with ethnolinguistic minorities in the Democratic Republic of Congo and Cameroon, and holds a Ph.D. in Ethnomusicology (UCLA), an M.A. in Intercultural Studies (Wheaton, IL), and a B.S. in Cognitive Sciences (Brown University). Brian is the co-author of *Make Arts for a Better Life: A Guide for Working with Communities,* and *Creating Local Arts Together*. Brian actively promotes artistic creativity for healing and education in communities affected by Huntington's Disease.



Dr. Kathleen J. Van Buren is an ethnomusicologist with special interests in medical and applied ethnomusicology, arts and social change, and musics of Africa. She is currently Honorary Research Fellow for the Department of Music at the University of Sheffield, where she previously worked as Lecturer in Ethnomusicology for ten years (2006-2016). She holds an MA and PhD from the Department of Ethnomusicology at the University of California, Los Angeles, and a BA in English and self-designed B.M. in Ethnomusicology from Lawrence University and Conservatory of Music in Appleton, Wisconsin. Her most recent publication is *Make Arts for a Better Life: A Guide for Working with Communities* (OUP, 2018), co-authored with Brian Schrag.



Patrick Kabanda's first book *The Creative Wealth of Nations: Can the Arts Advance Development?* was published in May 2018 by Cambridge University Press. A Juilliard-trained organist and Fletcher-trained international affairs professional, he received Juilliard's William Schuman Prize for outstanding achievement and leadership in music in 2003, and from 2012 to 2013 he was a Charles Francis Adams Scholar at The Fletcher School.
